

# "Laurel Line Passenger Service Bows Out to Motor Age Next Wednesday Night"

"This story won't be found on the obituary pages of the Jan 1, 1953 newspapers, but it could very well read: "Laurel Line passenger service passed away last night following a long illness."

"Death came to the majestic queen of the road at about 11:45 p.m. and stilled forever passenger service between Scranton and Wiles-Barre via the third-rail carrier. Cause of death was given as complications of senility. An autopsy has revealed that the passenger service has been in ill health for a long time. Complications were listed as too many private automobiles, car pools and bus lines which cut deeply into the Old Girls' blood supply or in words of the financial world she couldn't carry on any longer because there wasn't enough money coming in the keep her going.

The Lackawanna and Wyoming Valley Railroad better known as the Laurel Line will discontinue passenger service between the City and Wilkes-Barre on New Year's Eve ending an era in transportation which dates back to 1903.

The last car--or cars if the need be—will leave the Scranton Station at 10 p.m. en route to Wilkes-Barre. It will leave the Baron City at 10:45 p.m. and make its way to Scranton. The car or cars will then be moved into the Yards and that will officially end a service known to practically everyone in Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties. The carrier will then become exclusively a freight line. Eventually only one track will be utilized.

The Public Utility Commission has given the Laurel Line permission to abandon passenger service because of a terrific loss in revenue.

During its hay-days the Laurel Line catered to millions of clientele. Its peak year was in 1920 when a total of 4,220,596 passengers was carried. The passenger service dropped to 882,618 last year. This year's passenger figures will be less than 800,000."

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# Secretary Minutes of the November 14th Monthly Chapter Meeting at 7pm Iron Skillet Restaurant, Dupont, PA

It was announced that the 50/50 drawing this evening will be dedicated to support the Holiday Trains at Moscow Station for the Thanksgiving weekend.

President Pauli opens the meeting in due form and proceeds to call The Pledge to the Flag. Vee then requested a motion to approve the minutes of the October 10 meeting as appearing in November LL. Motion made by Mike Rushton, 2nd by Mike Bischak, passed without exception. Vee then requested the Treasurer provide his report to the body.

**Ed Zech** proceeded to provide a breakdown of balances in the accounts and then gave a detailed report on bills paid as well as income derived. Motion to accept the report by Carl packer, 2nd by Rich Vacula, passed without exception or correction.

President Pauli requested Nominations of Officers and Director of the Board positions be read by Nominations Chair Suzanne Kilcullen. The following Chapter Officers will serve for one (1) year terms:

There were no other nominations or protests lodged for the positions, therefore Chapter Secretary Ken Kertesz as duly mandated by Chapter Bylaws casts one (1) vote for each candidate by acclamation.

Moscow Station: Norm was absent, however Vee reported that a new patio heater was purchased for the FH; the furnace at the Station was fully serviced and Norm reported to her that it was noted that the recent lighting installed at the Station appears to be inadequate as to intensity. Norm is working with the contractor who installed to correct the problem.

**Station Director Roy Pauli** reports that the set up for the Holiday Trains is about 98% complete. The outside decorations need to be put in place. A work session is scheduled for November 27. Roy needs 6 people to volunteer this day.

The Holiday Trains are *SOLD OUT!* Trains arrive Moscow at 12:00 pm and depart 1:45pm all three days. This means roughly 165 riders for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, for each of the trains that arrive. There is only 1 train per day - all train arrivals are the same time. Given the ridership, the trash will accumulate at the Station and Roy is asking those who volunteer, offer to take a bag of trash with them when they leave. Last year, there was a cost incurred to have it all removed.

Roy estimates that 22 volunteers are needed for those 3 trains and he will pass around a sign-up sheet during the meetings seeking volunteers. He will also follow-up with a phone call. Lastly, when the train departs on Sunday, Roy needs a crew to complete. clean-up of the Station and Freight House. If you are there or can show up on Sunday, please help the Director pull Moscow back in pristine order. Otherwise, he is forced to do it all by himself. That is not fair to him.

Moscow runs on Volunteers. The Station is completely restored and looks great! Let's help keep it that way. **PPPLLLLEEEASE!!!** 

Jim Kilcullen, Chairman of the Calendar Committee, reports the Committee will convene on November 16 to begin development of the 2026 Calendar. Jim reports this will be the 50th Anniversary of Conrail, therefore heavy emphasis will be given when Conrail served the two Valleys. Vee inquired if the calendar will celebrate the 250th Anniversary of our -

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- Country? Jim stated the Committee will review this potential. **Paul Hart** reports that mail order sales of the 2025 calendar stands at 180 orders, which is not quite on pace with other years.

#### **Director Paul Hart of Membership**

Committee reports that 2025 renewal notices have been mailed. Ken reports that 2024 membership levels finished at 240. There were a number of new applications in late 2024 and those who did will have their memberships commence in 2025. Fortuna reports that the NRHS is a little quiet, catching their breath after the Convention is Harrisburg.
